

Preservation awareness advances in 2017; *education & advocacy efforts continue in 2018*

The year just completed was a busy one for the Newburyport Preservation Trust (NPT). In 2017, the ongoing education and advocacy efforts by the all-volunteer organization helped elevate preservation awareness among city residents and leadership. In turn, this led to significant improvements to city zoning laws and zoning enforcement that better protect historic neighborhoods. In 2018, education, advocacy ... and vigilance ... continue. Here is a recap of 2017 highlights:

• Newburyport Master Plan. NPT consulted with the city to smooth the rough edges of the new Master Plan to be more preservation-friendly.

• New zoning enforcement officer. For years NPT advocated for a city zoning enforcement officer to work independent of the building department. Hired part-time in June 2017, the new zoning enforcement officer began full-time in January 2018.


• The "1690 House" (former Towle shop). All year NPT has contested the developer's failure to meet its preservation agreements.

• **Preservation Week 2017**, "Newburyport in the Historic American Buildings Survey." The feature event was "An Evening in Gaol," at the privately-owned 1825 granite jail.

• The HABS and the HABs NOTS: Documenting the Architecture of Newburyport in the Historic American Buildings Survey. This book received the 2017 IPNE Book Award for Informational Nonfiction.

• **Preservation-friendly rezoning.** In October, the Newburyport City Council passed two zoning amendments to redistrict much of the North End and South End from R-3 ("multi-family") to R-2 ("two-family"). In November, the city council passed the High Street Residential Districts Ordinance.

• **Bartlet Mall Day.** NPT's historical interpretations were a part of this October 2017 event celebrating the venerable green space at the center of Newburyport.



Don't miss this NPT program Feb. 15 at 6 p.m.: '1970s Revisited: Would You Buy This House?'

The Newburyport Preservation Trust (NPT) presents an instructive look back in time with "1970s Revisited: Would You Buy This House?" on Feb. 15 from 6 to 7 p.m. at the Custom House Maritime Museum, 25 Water St., Newburyport. The presentation is free and open to the public. Seating for the free public program is limited. Doors open at 5:45 p.m.

The latest in the Trust's series of informative preservation sessions, this program takes an in-depth "warts and all" look at a homeowner's 1970s effort to make a livable home in a run-down c. 1750 Newburyport house – without ruining its character or charm. That intrepid 1970s homeowner is the session's presenter, local architect and current NPT co-president, Linda Miller.

The presentation recounts a process replete with good and bad design decisions, ignorance of correct restoration techniques, a huge learning curve, with many lessons learned and many new skills acquired, and some neighbors who thought she was out of her mind. 
